Call to Order

Chair Ron Nesbit called the meeting to order at 4:00 P.M.

Roll Call

Members present: Mayor Richard Scholtes, Glenn Gaylord, Gary Armon, Frankie Bly, Lars Bierly, Bob Bromeland, and Ron Nesbit. Absent Tim Juba and Bruce Hanson.

Staff present: City Administrator Mary Kennedy.

Approval of Minutes

Motion by Scholtes, second by Gaylord approving the minutes of Charter Commission Meeting of February 12, 2020. The motion was approved unanimously.

Old Business

New Business

Chairperson Ron Nesbit brought forth Resolutions/Process. Frundt reviewed the Charter process, suggesting that when a property is sold the process of the sale can take up to two months to finalize the ordinance with the Charter requirements. The requirements could lead into the possible loss of potential buyers for the HRA/EDA. Scholtes recommended amending Section 12.02 and eliminating the 60-90-day window allowing the passing of the Ordinance by changing the process to a resolution allowing for the reading of the resolution by the HRA /EDA and the sale of the property to continue. Gaylord felt by changing this it takes away authority from the Council and that too many things are being changed, the Council is losing its say. Scholtes implied that Council elects its committees to say what should be done, by amending the Charter it will help move the process along for sales.

 Motion by Armon, second by Bly to approve moving the recommendation on to the Council to amend the Charter section 12.02. The motion was approved unanimously.

SECTION 12.02 REAL PROPERTY - Fee title to real property of the City may be conveyed by the Mayor and Clerk-Administrator by authority of an ordinance duly adopted. The proceeds of any sale of such property shall be used as far as possible to retire any outstanding indebtedness incurred by the City in the purchase, construction, or improvement of this or other property used for the same public purpose. If there is no such outstanding indebtedness, the Council may by resolution designate some other public use for the proceeds. Such ordinances shall not be effective until thirty (30) days after its publication. If during said period a petition shall be filed signed by the greater of two hundred fifty (250) qualified voters or ten percent (10%) of the qualified voters voting at the last regular municipal election, a special election shall be called upon the question of approval of said ordinance. If approved, such ordinance shall be of full force and effect. If not, it shall fail. Such ordinance may provide for the conveyance of real estate to other public corporations upon such terms as the Council may deem appropriate. All other real property interests which convey less than fee title may be conveyed by the Mayor and Clerk-Administrator by authority of a resolution of the City Council without need for further publication or notice.

Next, Nesbit brought forth SECTION 5.13 THE RECALL. Frundt reviewed the section of the Charter that is subject to being amended, suggesting that our Charter language does not specify who that authorizes a recall and decides if its malfeasance or Misfeasance or is an act that results in that. This being a change that had been made to the constitution with the amending the charter to follow what the state constitution says.

Motion by Bierly, second by Armon to approve moving the

recommendation on to the Council to amend the Charter section

5.13. The motion was approved unanimously.

SECTION 5.13 THE RECALL - Any five (5) qualified voters may form themselves into committee for the purpose of bringing about the recall of any elected official including City Councilmembers and Board of Public Works members of the City. The committee shall certify to the Clerk-Administrator the name of the official whose removal is sought, a statement of the grounds for removal in not more than two hundred fifty (250) words, and their intention to bring about this recall. A copy of this certificate shall be attached to each signature paper and no signature paper shall be put into circulation previous to such certification. The Petition shall require the greater of two hundred fifty (250) signatures of

qualified voters or ten percent (10%) of the total number of qualified voters who cast their votes at the last election.
